From the Pastor

What was your favorite part of the trip?

As you are all aware, Heather and I just returned from a two-week trip in Europe, starting with a few days in Vienna, then hopping on a ship for a cruise up the Danube and ending with about a day and a half in Prague.

We really like Vienna and find it *fairly* easy to wander around the city because of its wonderfully efficient mass transit system. As this was my third visit to the city, but the first one where I was there for more than a day, and not knowing if I'd ever have a chance to return, there were some "bucket-list" things I wanted to accomplish.

Now, as a classical music nerd (and because I know how to show a girl a good time), I wanted to visit the graves of Beethoven, Brahms, Schubert, Johann and Joseph Strauss, von Suppe, and others. Fortunately, are almost all located in one location in Vienna's Central Cemetery (never found Salieri's or Schoenberg's because it was too blooming hot to wander around looking for them!).

The next day we took the tram to find composer and conductor Gustav Mahler's grave in a little cemetery located in the suburb of Grinzing. (I told you I know how to show a girl a good time!).



Many of you have asked is "what was your favorite part of the trip?" Well, believe it or not they weren't the bucket list items. My favorite part of the trip was the people watching. And on the ship, there were people from all over the world that we got to know – Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, Slovakia, as well as throughout the United States.... You name it, we met them and found many commonalities which was wonderful!

I know that church isn't aways what it should be, and church people aren't always what they could and should be. As someone once quipped: "To live above with the saints I love, Oh, that will be glory! But to dwell below, with the saints I know – now that's a different story!"

But then, someone asked, "Wait a minute! Where are the lamps? It's really dark in here. How will the church be lighted?" The nobleman pointed to some brackets in the walls, and then gave each family a lamp, which they were to bring with them each time they came to worship. "Each time you are here," he said, "the place where you are seated will be lighted. When you are not here, that place will be dark. This is to remind you that whenever you fail to come to church, some part of God's house will be dark."

Wow! Get it? Yes, Christ came to die for the sins of the world, but he also came to found a new community. A community charged with the responsibility of delivering the message of the cross to the world. If we fail to do our part as witnesses to the light of the world, then the world will forever remain in darkness.

After Certaínty...

Compassion

Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. popularized the concept of the *beloved community* as a rational model of justice and social change grounded in nonviolence and compassion. Knowing Dr. King's deep roots in the church and Christian theology, and his commitment to end racism and other forms of hatred and division, we can be assured that his Beloved Community was not a version of Bonhoeffer's naive "wish dream," but a real way to people to live together.

The *beloved-ness* of the community is where compassion comes in. Choosing compassion over certainty, as Paul also urged the church to do, does not mean denying the truth. In fact, it's the opposite: Compassion can create the conditions for learning, raising awareness and a change of mind and heart. Wielding knowledge from a position of superiority makes sense if you determined to be opponents. But if the goal is to be heard and understood, *love* is the better way.

A violinist once performed in the New York City subway, entertaining passersby for 45 minutes. A few tossed him cash, totaling about \$30 by the time he concluded.
